

Stuck in the Middle with You

John 8 New Revised Standard Version (NRSV)

8¹ while Jesus went to the Mount of Olives. ² Early in the morning he came again to the temple. All the people came to him and he sat down and began to teach them. ³ The scribes and the Pharisees brought a woman who had been caught in adultery; and making her stand before all of them, ⁴ they said to him, "Teacher, this woman was caught in the very act of committing adultery. ⁵ Now in the law Moses commanded us to stone such women. Now what do you say?" ⁶ They said this to test him, so that they might have some charge to bring against him. Jesus bent down and wrote with his finger on the ground. ⁷ When they kept on questioning him, he straightened up and said to them, "Let anyone among you who is without sin be the first to throw a stone at her." ⁸ And once again he bent down and wrote on the ground. ⁹ When they heard it, they went away, one by one, beginning with the elders; and Jesus was left alone with the woman standing before him. ¹⁰ Jesus straightened up and said to her, "Woman, where are they? Has no one condemned you?" ¹¹ She said, "No one, sir." And Jesus said, "Neither do I condemn you. Go your way, and from now on do not sin again."

So far, 2020 is shaping up to be an exciting year. How ever exciting it appears and hopeful we may be, there is some anxiety and tension in the air, as the United Methodist Church prepares for the 2020 General Conference. As a worldwide denomination, the UMC holds their General Conference every four years. At this General Conference, the conference delegates discuss and vote on proposals that might impact the United Methodist doctrine. Any action that is voted into legislation is then added to the United Methodist Book of Discipline. Essentially, the Book of Discipline offers to the whole denomination a binding document that gives direction to how we operate as a denomination, council of Bishops, jurisdictional conference, annual conference, district and local church.

There is tension in the air, living as a United Methodist in our current climate, as the church seeks to determine a way forward regarding human sexuality issues. This tension is much like being a child caught in the middle of an ugly divorce. I wonder, can you visualize the tension of this illustration? Tension happens when the child is faced with the uncomfortable choice of having to decide. Both parents are positioning themselves to get the child to be on their side. Maybe they are trying to convince the child to pick which parent they will side with or which parent they will love more or which parent they will reside with. Both parents have their arguments as to why living with them would be the better choice for the child. Maybe both parents are trying to convince the child why to turn away from the other parent. No matter what the angle is, or motivation is, the reality is, the child finds themselves "*Stuck in the Middle."*

Truth be told, continuing with this illustration, the child is the one living in the tension, not the parents. Truth be told, the child loves both parents. Truth be told, the child just wants to be a child. Sometimes I get a sense the local church has become like the child stuck in the middle. And when we find ourselves stuck in the middle, we find ourselves carrying the weight of tension that seems to be dividing us as a denomination and distracting us from our mission. Remember our mission? "To make and mature disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world."

During this season of tension in the church, I wonder if we could find comfort and peace realizing that Jesus found himself stuck in the middle all the time. In our passage today, we see a woman caught in adultery on one side and the church, ready to carry out the law, on the other side. Where is Jesus? Stuck in the middle! And in the middle, he remains a calm, non-anxious presence, offering both grace and truth to each side. He offers grace to the woman by meeting her where she's at in her life. He's not showing her condemnation, judgment or anger. He offers her forgiveness. To the church he offers grace by simply hearing their concerns and taking their questions concerning the direction they should proceed. Jesus goes on to then offer truth to both sides as well. To the woman he says go and sin no more. To the church he says, he who has not sinned, carry out the law. Both sides have received grace and truth. Both sides are reminded of the mission of Jesus Christ. That mission? To offer the liberating power and restoring grace of Jesus Christ to all people.

Jesus found himself stuck in the middle most of his life. Stuck in the middle between the glory of heaven and the fallenness of this world. Stuck in the middle between brokenness and wholeness. Stuck in the middle between the keepers of the law (the church) and the people God so desired to redeem. Even upon his death, Jesus found himself stuck in the middle, crucified between two criminals. On one side he had a criminal that recognized and accepted Jesus for who he was. On the other side he had a criminal that despised and rejected him. In the end, I find myself thinking that maybe, just maybe, being stuck in the middle is exactly where God wants us to be. Because that is where Jesus would be.

So, let me close this long-winded article with this challenge. Would you consider remaining stuck in the middle with Jesus? Can we be a church ready to offer both grace and truth? Can we be a church committed to being in prayer for the 832 delegates to the General Conference? Can we be a church that remains focused on the command Jesus gave us, "Go therefore and make disciples?" Can we be a church willing to extend grace to both sides? Can we be a church dedicated to maturing as disciples? I think if we remain stuck in the middle, we'll find the very best God has to offer, and that is Jesus!




